RE: Joint statement from Vida Lin, President and Founder, Asian Community Development Council (ACDC) and Duy Nguyen, Executive Director, One APIA Nevada, on the Passing of Former Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta

Today the nation and Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and Pacific Islanders (AANHPIs) lost a friend, an advocate, and a pillar of the community. Former Secretary of Transportation Norman Mineta was a trailblazer and giant, mentoring many community leaders to fight for seats at the table and uplifting their voices to make sure they were heard. Secretary Mineta's story is the story of the American Dream—of what could be possible, of what could come of hard work and determination, and of what could be done by caring for each other and fighting for the betterment of not only one's own community, but others as well.
